THE BENEFITS OF STUDYING ABROAD

The Institute of International Education and the U.S. Department of Education report that "although African-American students comprise 14% of post secondary student enrollment, they make up only 3.4% of study abroad participants." Study abroad provides an excellent opportunity to earn credit toward your degree while living and studying in a foreign city. You gain important perspective on your own country through the eyes of another country's citizens.

The first step in selecting an overseas studies program is to think about your academic goals for study abroad. Find one that meets your specific needs and goals. Ask yourself these questions: **1**. How does foreign study fit in with your major program? **2**. What kinds of courses will complement the work you do at your college?

3. Are there topics you could explore better overseas than at your college? **4**. Do you have the necessary background knowledge to take major courses at a foreign university or can you acquire it before you go?

Look for programs that have the courses you need to meet your goals. Select courses that take advantage of your study abroad location.

Studying abroad will allow you the opportunity to immerse in an environment filled with new customs and an entirely different culture. Live with a family, instead of rooming with fellow Americans. Also, seize the opportunity to do an internship, volunteer assignment or work in the place you are studying abroad.

There are many career opportunities when you have completed your study abroad. If you take calculated risks, plan in advance and take advantage of all study abroad has to offer, you will become that "memorable candidate" and you will have developed skills and attitudes that will stay with you for a lifetime. The Boren Scholarship Awards

This National Security Education scholarship provided unique funding opportunities for U.S. undergraduate and graduate students to add important international and language components to their education. The awards focus on geographic areas, language and fields of study that are critical to U.S. interests and underrepresented in study abroad. Recipients may apply to study in Africa, Asia, Central & Eastern Europe, Eurasia, Latin America or the Middle East. The length of study for Boren Awards varies. Full academic year or semester is open to all students. However summer awards of 8 weeks or longer are available to students majoring in science, technology, engineering or mathematics. CROSS CULTURAL SOLUTIONS

Cross Cultural Solutions is an international non-profit organization that operates shortterm volunteer programs in 12 countries around the world. Africa (Ghana, Morocco, South Africa and Tanzania); Asia (China, India and Thailand); Eastern Europe (Russia) and Latin America (Brazil, Costa Rica, Guatemala and Peru). They have no political or religious affiliations. They are fully staffed in each country where they operate volunteer programs. The mission is to operate volunteer programs around the world in partnership with sustainable community initiatives, bringing people together to work side-by side while sharing perspectives and fostering cultural understanding.

Why volunteer abroad? It is a way for people to lend their skills, service and time in other areas of the world. You can also gain a cultural experience that you would not gain as a conventional tourist.

The CCS has special consultative status with the United Nations and is a member of the International Volunteer Programs Association. There are 4 different volunteering programs and all are feature their unique Program design; volunteer work, cultural and learning activities, free time, and homebased where volunteers live together.

GILMAN SCHOLARSHIP

The Gilman Scholarship is open to US citizen, undergraduate students who wish to study abroad during the fall, spring, summer or academic year. Students may apply worldwide. To be eligible you must be receiving a Federal Pell Grant. Applications are to be completed online. You must notify your financial aid and study abroad advisor that you are applying. # copies of your transcripts from your current institution and any previous schools listed. Students studying critical need languages are automatically considered for the Gilman Critical Need Language Supplement, which provides Gilman recipients with an additional \$3,000 fir a total possible award of up to \$8,000. OTHER IMPORTANT INFORMATION......



PASSPORTS & VISAS All persons traveling by air, land and sea are required to present a passport book/card or other valid travel documents to enter or reenter the Untied States. The passport card however is only valid for land and sea travel between the U. S. and Canada, Mexico, the Caribbean region and Bermuda.

Passport books/cards are valid for 10 years for adults and 5 years for minors under age 16. Currently passport fees are: \$75 and \$25 processing fee. You are required to submit the following: Original Birth Certificate, valid government issued Photo Id, and 2 color passport photos (2x 2) in size. ALL first time applicants must apply in person at a Passport Agency, Acceptance Facility*, U.S. Embassy or Consulate.* Post Office, library or municipal office.

Visas- Generally a citizen of a foreign county who seeks to enter the U.S. must first obtain a U.S. visa which is placed in their passport. U.S. citizens don't need a visa for travel, but may need a visa issued by an embassy of a country they wish to visit when traveling abroad. There are two types of visas- (B-1) Business Visitor Visa. If traveling to consult with business associates, travel for a scientific, educational. professional or business convention or conference on specific dates, settle and estate or negotiate a contract this is the correct visa. (B-2) Pleasure, Tourism, Medical Treatment. Traveling is recreational in nature, amusements, visits with friends or relatives, rest medical treatment. activities of a fraternal, social or service nature and participation by amateurs. EMBASSIES

In over 260 countries around the world, there are U. S. Embassies and Consulates with consular officers available to provide assistance to Americans abroad. If you need help in case of an emergency, you should consider the embassy your first point of contact. Find the U.S. Embassy in the country you are visiting and learn where it is located as well as its contact information. The U. S. Embassy is your 9-1-1 overseas. Some of the services offered by U.S. Embassy include:

- Emergency Services
- Health Emergencies
- Arrests
- Deaths
- Missing Persons
- Non-emergency services
 - o Absentee voting
 - Selective Service registration
 - Transfer of Social Security benefits
 - Providing U. S. tax forms
 - Notarizing documents
 - Providing information on obtaining foreign public documents

Services not offered:

- Tourism services
- Commercial services/banking
- Search for missing luggage

- Settling of commercial disputes for U.S. citizens
- Interpreter services
- Lawyer advice and services

If you are planning to travel abroad, register your trip with the Department of State. It makes it possible to contact you if necessary, whether it's a family emergency in the States or a crisis in the country in which you are visiting, registration assists the Embassy of Consulate in reaching you. It is free and can be done online. Leave a copy of your trip itinerary with family or friends; make two copies of your passport identification page, your airline tickets, driver license and credit cards you plan to take. Also leave a copy of your traveler checks' serial numbers. Keep one copy with you, but separate from your originals.
